<p>Gakonga</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Gakonga is based in London but was born in Kenya near the foot of Mount Kilimanjaro. He began experimenting with plant dyes and sea shells on his father's wise-man mud hut. He is inspired by the colours of his homeland Kenya. The golds and reds of the African sunset and the bright, happy colours of a tribal dance. Gakonga is a trained artist in education, he provides visual Arts and dance workshops to Primary and Secondary schools, Art centres and Community centres. Gakonga runs school workshops and has worked with children and teachers in over 300 schools across the UK. 	
<p>Stephen Njenga</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Born in 1962 in Kenya, Njenga was part of the Kikuyu tribe He uses watercolours, oils and pastels to create semi abstract African paintings. Much of his work is inspired by the Maasai tribe and African wild life. His art uses a variety of texture, colour, shapes and pattern. 	


What? Key Skills

What? Key Vocabulary

Complementary colours	Colours that are directly opposite on the colour wheel.	Abstract	Abstract art is more about the shapes and colours and the feelings it expresses, not about the accurate portrayal of a subject.
Geometric form	regular shapes , such as squares, rectangles, circles, cubes, spheres etc.	Composition	The term refers to the arrangement of elements within a work of art .
